SOCIOLOGY: An Analysis of Life in Modern Society, *Third Edition*
By ARNOLD W. GREEN, The Pennsylvania State University. 672 pages,
\$6.95.

This introductory sociology text traces the major trends in modern American society. Anthropological and historical materials are used fairly extensively, but always for purposes of drawing comparisons or tracing development. Conceptual and theoretical matters are considered as they enrich the descriptive emphasis. Written with flavor, the pages are alive with ideas.

SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY

By JACK H. CURTIS, Marquette University, Milwaukee. 435 pages,
\$7.50.

The author of this text develops his "interactionist" approach by an examination of the individual personality in terms of learning, motivation, life experiences in age groups, and in culture. Then the interacting individual is studied under the broader aspects of the organizations in which he participates. Small groups, collective behavior, and social structure are then examined with an eye to the psychological processes they stimulate.

A SOCIOLOGICAL APPROACH TO EDUCATION, *Third Edition*
By LLOYD ALLEN COOK and ELAINE FORSYTH COOK, formerly
of Wayne State University. McGraw-Hill Foundations of Education Series. 376 pages, \$6.75.

This completely recast and rewritten edition of the authors' widely used text ties together communities, children, and the schools in a logical, coherent view of what education should be and do in a time of change and confusion.

SOCIAL STATISTICS

By HUBERT M. BLALOCK, Yale University, McGraw-Hill Series in Sociology. 480 pages, \$7.95.

This text provides students having limited mathematical backgrounds with an understanding of the fundamental ideas of statistical inference. It is written primarily for advanced undergraduate and graduate students of sociology. As compared with other statistics texts for sociologists with little mathematics backgrounds, Blalock places a greater emphasis on the logic of statistical inference and on understanding basic concepts.

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This book, by a highly respected anthropologist, describes the present status of theoretical development in cultural anthropology and attempts to develop an organismic-type working hypothesis, on the basis of empirical field research in many parts of the world, which will unite cultural and physical anthropology with biology, ecology, and social sciences, and the psychological disciplines toward a new, multi-discipline science of mankind.
