SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY

By JACK H. CURTIS, Marquette University. 435 pages, \$7.50.

The author of this text develops his "interactionist" approach by an examination of the individual personality in terms of learning, motivation, life experiences in age groups, and in culture. Then the interacting individual is studied under the broader aspects of the organizations in which he participates. Small groups, collective behavior, and social structure are then examined with an eye to the psychological processes they stimulate.
