OUTSTANDING MCGRAW-HILL BOOKS IN SOCIOLOGY

SOCIAL STRATIFICATION

By EGON BERGEL, Springfield College. **McGraw-Hill Series in Sociology.** 462 pages, \$7.95

Although the text gives special attention to the contemporary American scene, all phases and aspects of social stratification are treated—the past and the present; castes and estates; classes in China, in Western Europe, and in Soviet Russia. The stress is on the fact that classes represent specific sub-cultures within a nation. Differences in attitudes and behavior, in life chances and life style, in cultural interests and cultural achievements are analyzed and evaluated. Evidence presented by both American and foreign writers is extensively used throughout the book.

SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY

By JACK H. CURTIS, Marquette University, 435 pages, \$7.50

This book demonstrates that social psychology is a valid scientific body of knowledge in its own right. The parent sciences of sociology and psychology only serve to enrich its content. This Catholic textbook retains Catholic values on the nature of man, yet maintains the scientific standards of both sociology and psychology. The interactionist approach is used.

SOCIAL STATISTICS

By HUBERT M. BLALOCK, Yale University. **McGraw-Hill Series in Sociology.** 480 pages, \$7.95

This text provides students having limited mathematical backgrounds with an understanding of the fundamental ideas of statistical inference. It is written primarily for advanced undergraduate and graduate students of sociology. As compared with other statistics texts for sociologists with little mathematical background, Blalock places a greater emphasis on the logic of statistical inference and on understanding basic concepts.

SOCIOLOGY OF RELIGION

By GLENN M. VERNON, Brigham Young University. **McGraw-Hill Series in Sociology.** 432 pages, \$7.95

This book draws together the major findings sociologists and other social scientists have found in their studies of the religious behavior of man. Exploring the religious dimensions of man's relationship to man, the author focuses upon man as a social being who engages in religious behavior. Religion is viewed as an interacting element in a larger socio-cultural milieu. Emphasized is the significance that most social interaction is symbolic interaction.

CRIME, JUSTICE, AND CORRECTION

By PAUL W. TAPPAN, New York University. **McGraw-Hill Series in Sociology.** 781 pages, \$7.95

Designed for undergraduate and graduate students in criminology and penology courses, this book covers the nature and causes of crime, the administration of justice, and corrections. The volume attempts to synthesize theories of the behavioral sciences in its interpretation of crime and its treatment. A comprehensive treatment of legal aspects of criminology and criminological and behavioral theory is included. Many illustrative case studies are incorporated.
